Right before the big race, Cade realized he was the only one without a Mint Julep. So with a shout, he announced to everyone in his box that he was going to get one more drink if anyone needed anything.

"I have an extra drink over here if you want it," a sweet voice answered from the next box. Cade turned around to see Danielle smiling ear to ear. What happens next is where the boat was sunk, concrete was poured, put the pencils away and get out the pens....IT WAS OVER!!!

Thinking that she was pretty darn cute, Cade gladly accepted the

offer, but when he reached for the drink, Danielle said, "If you want this drink, then you need to hop over this rail and get it buddy!"



Cade Culver, the middle child of three born to Ed and Julie, is undeniably proud of his roots in the Texas Panhandle and Oklahoma. For starters, his parents live in Canadian. Ed is a Petroleum Landman and President of Arrington CJM, Inc. Ed and Julie both graduated from The University of Oklahoma. Big Ed played football for Barry



Switzer at OU, and he has been a Hemphill County Commissioner for 16 years. Julie played Women's Basketball at OU, worked for the late Gov. William P. Clements and the late State Representative Dick Waterfield as their District Representative in the Texas Panhandle, and taught elementary school in Canadian for 25 years. Cade's maternal grandparents are George and Jane Arrington also of Canadian. George has been an independent oil and gas producer for more than 50 years. He runs a cow-calf operation at the Arrington Rocking Chair Ranch SE of Canadian, served as past President of the Panhandle Plains Museum, and had served on the Red River Water Authority Board for 19 years. Jane has served on many boards in the Texas Panhandle, including the Don Harrington Cancer Center Board and the Coffee Memorial Blood Center Board.

Cade's paternal grandparents are Bob Ed and Jo Ellen Culver of Tahlequah, OK. The Culver Family owned and operated Reed-Culver Funeral home in Tahlequah for 50 years. After retiring, Bob Ed served in the Oklahoma Legislature as a State representative for 10 years.

"Growing up in Canadian, where God puts us to bed underneath the stars and wakes us up with a huge golden sun," says Cade, "and where there are more oil wells and cattle than people, taught me that stock markets will come and go, but friends and family will be there forever. From 'Friday Night Lights' to brisk horseback mornings, Canadian was a great place to build my foundation for life. It gave me the values and excitement that get me through every day."

Cade's journey led him to attend the United States Military Academy at West Point. He says, "It was there that I learned the true meaning of really cold weather, abundant snow and extreme discipline."

While at West Point, Cade traded the football field for the rugby pitch. An unfortunate injury sustained during a rugby match kept Cade from being commissioned into the United States Army upon graduation.

After West Point, Cade followed his best friend and brother, Capp,

to Atlanta, Georgia. They entered into the Fresh Cut Produce Industry with the family owned and operated company, Taylor Farms. The company is the world's largest shipper of fresh cut fruits and vegetables. After one short year in Atlanta, Cade was transferred to Nashville where his career flourished. Currently, Cade is the National Retail Product Manager for Taylor Farms Retail, Inc.

While he loves his job, Cade is madly in love with Danielle. He says, "My life truly began when I met the woman of my dreams. Every day I spend with Danielle makes me a better person, and I am looking forward to all the years to come."

The youngest of four, Danielle was born to Therese and Joseph Ciampa of Manhasset, New York. The Culver-Ciampa wedding grabbed the attention of its attendants as well as the entire downtown of Nashville that evening in November. The ceremony was different than most weddings. They chose to not

have a wedding party, a scenario perfect for the circular stage in the Rotunda of the Country Music Hall of Fame. All eyes watched attentively as Danielle, dressed in a lovely Blue Label Amsale gown, and Cade, in Calvin Klein, declared their vows with the help of Kade Curry, their preacher from Canadian. The bride changed into a knee length custom designed Karen Hendrix Couture number for the reception, which was held in the Conservatory of the Country Music Hall of Fame. It was an extravaganza to say the least. Every detail was covered!

Working with the bride and her mother, the wedding planner enlisted Event Designer Jennifer Milam (*Reveal Event Style*) and Prop Builder Brian Best (*Front Porch Farms*) to create an elegant fashion-filled Derby atmosphere. Rustic Texas props were adorned with accents of New York style. Intricate lighting by *Nashville Event Lighting* lit up the sky and vibrant pink runners grazed the steps of the museum, creating a jealous buzz among onlookers! The waiters dressed like Derby jockeys, and the tables were beautifully decorated with the names of famous horses from the Derby's history. Abundant colorful floral arrangements greeted each guest while candles twinkled in mason jars scattered around.

Special touches of the evening included their cake - an amazing creation by Jay Qualls of *Maples Wedding Cakes*, who recently appeared on TLC's show *Next Great Baker* – and an array of musical entertainment. Vocalists including Joey Ciampa, Cassie Ballew and Brett Duke, serenaded the couple and guests. The Craig Duncan Band played early on and then guests partied the night way to the tunes of "Super T."

Anyone who meets Danielle and Cade can sense the love that they share, which couldn't be more evident than in their vows spoken that November day. Perhaps Cade didn't win money on Derby Day, but he did win the ultimate prize, to race down the track with Danielle for the rest of his life!
